those of you who have volunteered, donated, and supported our organization who share my passion to help others learn, no matter how old, where they live, or where they come from.

I cannot think of a more satisfying experience to share...helping others learn.

As a reminder, many of our families and volunteers will be travelling during their holiday seasons. A temporary hold on tutoring sessions during these travel times are essential. We'll just pick up where we left off. I encourage the students and volunteers to share with each other where they went, what reading they did (signs, brochures, books, etc.). Pictures are great too. Building a rapport with each other helps students learn and encourages them to read. On that note, I encourage students to read 20 minutes every night whether they are attending tutoring sessions or not. It doesn't matter what they read, it needs to be easy enough for them to read independently or out loud to someone.

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

What We Are Reading



I discovered a book at the library entitled James Patterson by James Patterson: The stories of my life. I have never read any of his books or seen any of his movies because I thought they all were thrillers/mysteries--which I don't read or watch; yet, I see his books everywhere. So I was curious about who this James Patterson is! I am almost finished with the book and have come to love him and his vignettes on his life (or small stories as he calls them).

He is humorous, honest, easy to read and has also written non-fiction and children's books. I was very surprised to learn that he tried 30 times to have his first book published. He worked for an advertising firm (from humble beginnings to a VP

position while writing his first novels!) and came up with some familiar jingles. You'll have to read the book to find out which ones!

Like Michael Jordan and Winston Churchill, Patterson never gave up. He has written two books with Bill Clinton; again a surprise to me! He speaks about his take on critics and his movies, loves of his life, and people who impacted him. He played



golf with three presidents. Patterson writes using a 30-70 **page** outline for each book; stressing "Outline, outline, outline" to children when he speaks to them from his story entitled, "what I blabber about to the kids at elementary schools across the country" (pp. 242-243).

There is a thread, a value, on pushing people to read throughout his biography, especially children. Patterson started a children's publishing company with his publicist, Little, Brown, called **JIMMY Books**. Some of the books are: *I Funny* (surprise twist!), *Middle school: The worst years of my life,* and *Pottymouth and Stoopid*. He leaves parents with this thought: if we have rules such as no cell phones at the table (my example), why can't you make this rule: "We read in our house (p.241)".

Very cool author! Not convinced to read his mysteries or thrillers yet, but maybe the children's books and nonfiction! A great book about a very popular and valued author. Get to know the REAL James Patterson. I did and love him!
