Hello everyone!

Thank you for taking the time to read our newsletter, which is filled with something of interest for everyone!

A big shout out to those of you who support us financially and/or volunteer your time to the Palmetto Literacy Council. Due to your efforts, we just keep growing.

We ended 2023 with 50 students being tutored. We now have 62! We still have 24 students on the waitlist. This only happens when the whole team is working together! Rock on!

If you know anyone willing to give the community 2 hours/week, please share information about your good work and the dates for the Volunteer Orientation and Trainings (see below). We have several students in Conway, Socastee, Surfside Beach, and Carolina Forest Libraries waiting for tutors. Some of them for almost a year. UGH!

We had 5 Tutors participate in the Tutor Talk in February and 10 in January. These meetings are open to anyone! It is a great place to review how to run the tutoring sessions, share strategies, and get to meet other Tutors from all over the county. We've had requests for two Tutor Talks per month. Tutor Tips for March



Each month, Dr. Dodi Hodges, executive director of the Palmetto Literacy Council, hosts "Tutor Talks", informal get-togethers for volunteer tutors where they can exchange ideas and discuss what does and doesn't work for their students.

Whether you've been a tutor for years, or are just starting, it's a great way to get to know your peers and share common goals for our students.

We're going to gather some of these tutor tips and ideas for inclusion in future newsletters in the hopes they will be of use to others:

Tip one from Peggie Anderson:

"Should I correct spelling errors and incorrect sentence structure even when my student has written the correct answer to an exercise question?

Yes! First, I stress to my students that the answer is correct but needs just a little bit of finetuning. Next, I point out the words that are misspelled and direct him to the reading to identify the correct spelling.

Then, I address sentence structure. Often, this can be easily repaired. It's usually just one or two run-one sentences that proper punctuation can quickly correct. And done!"

Tip two from Bonnie Kelley:

"I find that starting with five to six fry (sight) words really does build confidence that continues throughout the remainder of the lesson plan.

Regarding the frequently long vocabulary list, separating syllables helps the student recognize the word, and then "clapping" the syllables aids the students in remembering the word. The first-grade literature has questions to answer verbally. I usually write the questions on a separate paper and encourage writing the answers in complete sentences.

This is expected of him in his school classroom and I hope it helps him follow through in school.

Lastly, I keep a book in my tote bag and if time allows we take turns reading a page. The student is always excited to do this."

Artificial Intelligence - Useful in Writing? Are You Ready?

Artificial intelligence can weave words about a subject like a spider spinning a web. Trained on vast amounts of text, it delves into existing information, extracting facts, statistics, and even stylistic nuances. Armed with this knowledge, it then crafts sentences, paragraphs, even entire narratives, mimicking the structure and tone of human writing. It can't

truly understand or experience the subject like a human can, but it can analyze and synthesize data to present a comprehensive and coherent, if not deeply insightful, view. Al is a skilled imitator, not an original thinker, but in its digital inkwell, it holds the potential to write with speed, accuracy, and even a semblance of human flair.

As an example of AI in use, the entire paragraph above was generated by artificial intelligence. I didn't write one word of it. I went to Google's AI writing assistant, Bard [now known as Gemini], and put in this prompt:



"Write a short paragraph explaining how artificial intelligence can write about a subject."

Bard "thought" about it for about 4 seconds, then spit out the paragraph. This is quite useful if one is in a hurry or is inclined to cheat. A major problem is that sometimes AI is more artificial and not so intelligent. It can sometimes write a very interesting explanation of a topic and get the facts just plain wrong. It's helpful if the user has a general knowledge of the subject to be able to do some basic fact-checking.

The little robot picture was also generated by AI, using the prompt "A friendly robot is writing in his journal." This is a case of an intelligent being using artificial intelligence to generate an image of an artificial being doing something intelligent, to portray artificial intelligence. Good luck making sense out of THAT sentence. :-)
